PER CURIAM.

Meyer appeals the summary denial of his motion for post-conviction relief filed pursuant to Florida Rule of Criminal Procedure 3.850. The trial court denied the motion as untimely filed. We reverse.<sup>1</sup>

Meyer was adjudicated guilty of two counts of sexual battery on March 8, 2006. He did not seek a direct appeal. His motion for post-conviction relief was presented to prison officials for mailing on March 25, 2008. Pursuant to Rule 3.850(b), an inmate has

two years from the date on which a conviction and sentence become final within which to file a motion for post-conviction relief. If there is no appeal, the judgment and sentence do not become final for purposes of this rule until the thirty-day period for filing an appeal expires. See, e.g., *Mingo v. State*, 790 So. 2d 1164 (Fla. 2d DCA 2001); *Black v. State*, 750 So. 2d 162 (Fla. 3d DCA 2000); *Ramos v. State*, 658 So. 2d 169 (Fla. 3d DCA 1995). Thus, Meyer's motion was timely filed because his conviction and sentence did not become final until April 7, 2006.

REVERSED and REMANDED.
